Background (2016/17)

- HWP includes all 11 waste authorities
- Collection and disposal services - £83m
- Joint Waste Strategy 2007 – 2012 – needs updating !!!
- Herts Waste Partnership Agreement signed in January 2012
- Alternative Financial Model – worth £3.7 million per annum
- Took over the Herts Fly Tipping Group in early 2016



The HWP in numbers (2016/17)

- 2016/17 performance - recycling 52.2%
- 2016/17 performance - landfill diversion 88.5%
- Total household waste **1024** kgs per hhold – 2nd lowest in last 7 years
- Residual household waste **490** kgs per hhold – lowest in last 7 years
- Recycling household waste **211** kgs per hhold – highest in last 7 years
- 2016/17 – **15,216** fly tips in Hertfordshire
- 2016/17 – fly tipping estimated to have cost **£1.1 million**
- **£132,000** secured from Herts PCC to tackle fly tipping (Sept 16 – Mar 18)



Recent Key Developments

- 2016/17 – Three Rivers first to charge for garden waste
- 2016/17 – New services launched in a number of authorities
- East Herts & North Herts – first Herts ‘joint waste service’
- Expansion of weekly food waste services
- HWP / FTG – now Hertfordshire’s lead group on fly tipping
- Brexit – gaps in environmental law / Circular Economy Directive

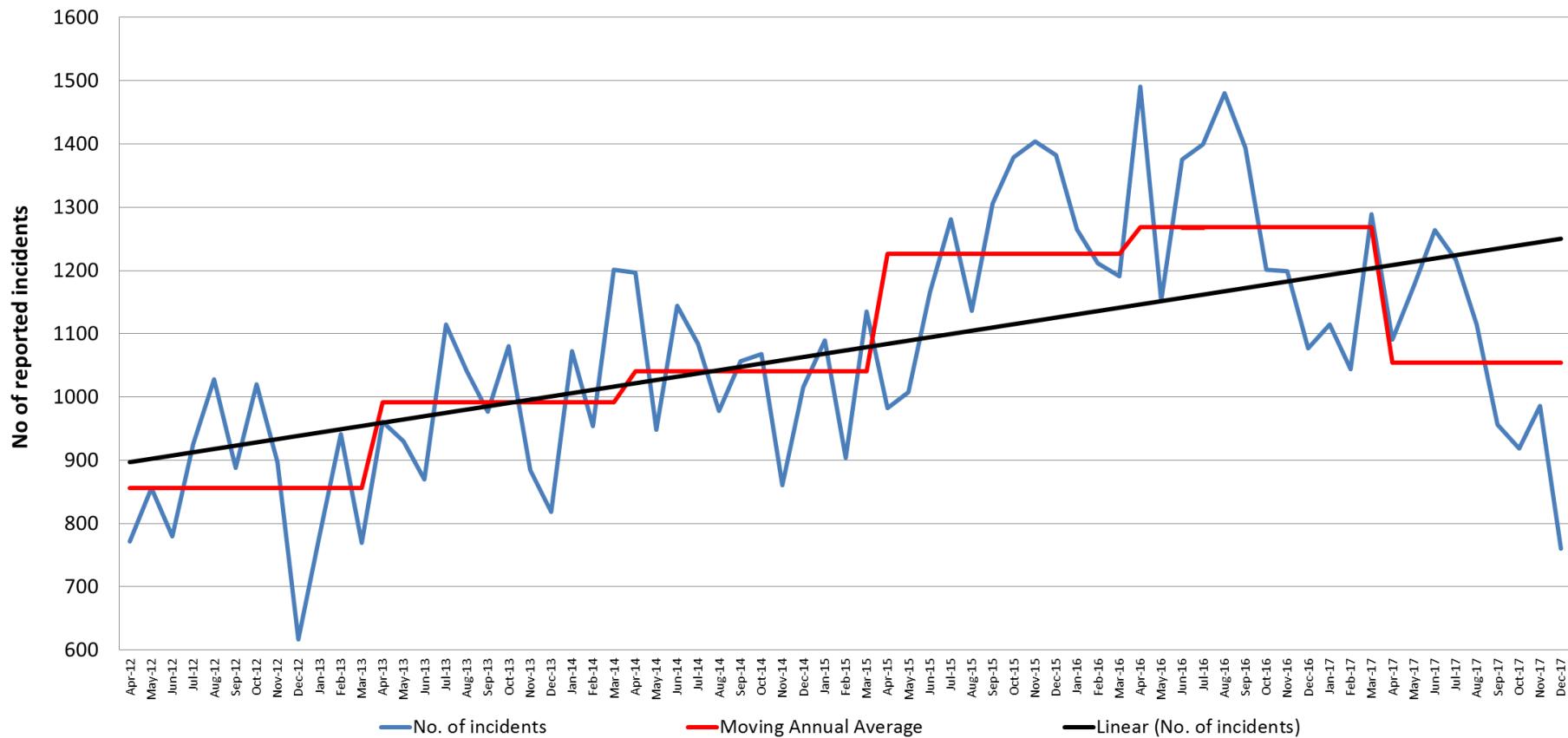

Fly tipping across the HWP - 6 Year View

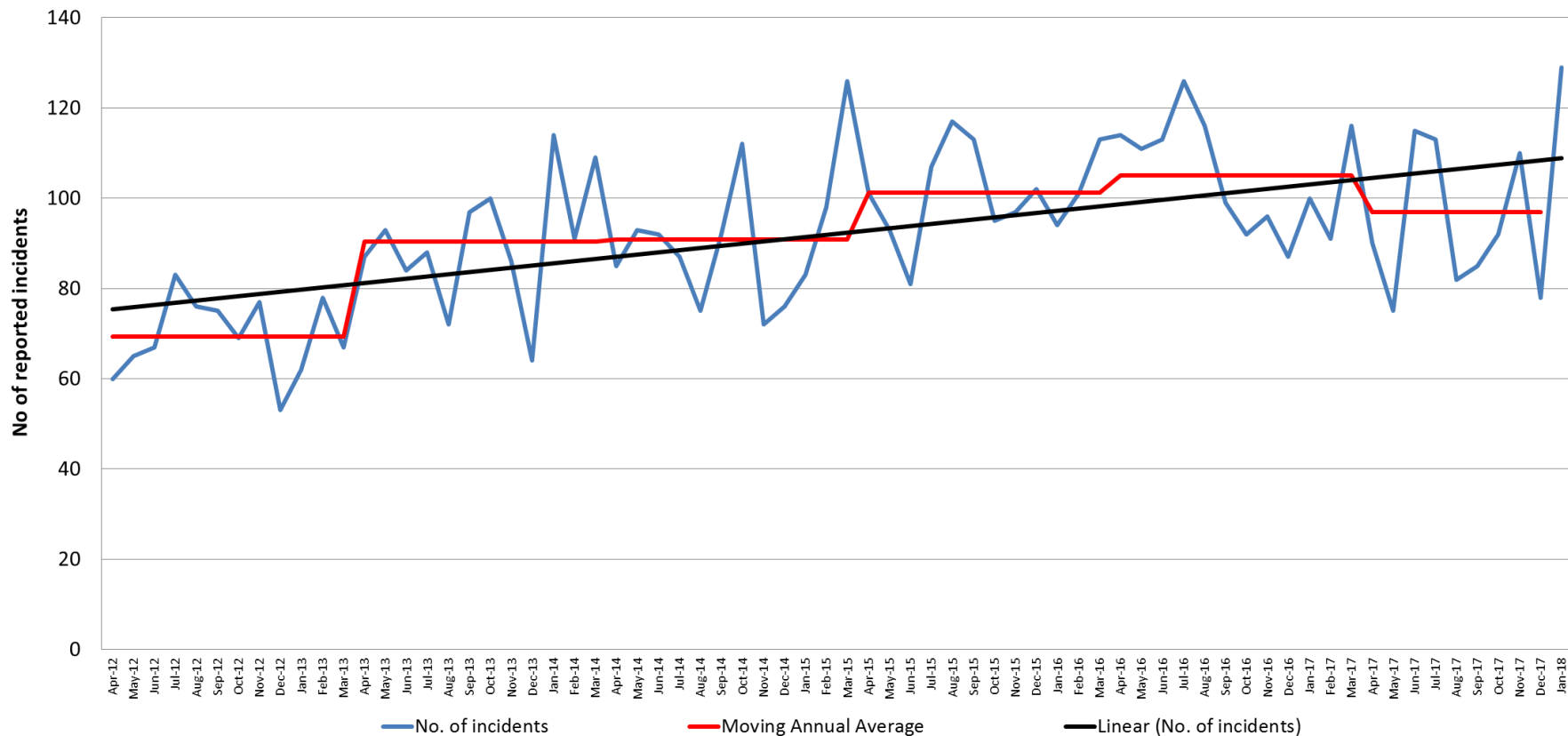

Working with the Police & Crime Commissioner

- Dialogue initiated early 2016 (OPCC part of the FTG)
- Fly tipping key issue in local elections
- PCC nuisance fund worth £400,000 over 4 years (£100k per annum)
- HWP already had a delivery mechanism for distributing challenge funding
- £82,266 secured during 2016/17 (total project value £115,441)
- £50,000 secured during 2017/18 (est. total project value **£75,000**)
- First FTG work programme agreed – Sept 2016 – March 2018
- Quarterly updates to HWP Directors and Members – reports also made available to OPCC and Herts Constabulary colleagues



FTG Work Prog. - highlights

- Fly tipping campaign (& toolkit) – Q4 2017/18
- Magistrates dialogue – better prosecutions
- Monthly reports either direct or via WDF
- Common definition of fly tipping agreed
- 8 out of 10 LAs issue the same FPN

FTG KBT Research Project findings

- only 28% of people knew what their Duty of Care was
- awareness of fines or prosecutions was over 50% the perceived threat of enforcement was low, with only 11% of respondents thinking offenders would be caught.
- lack of awareness of what fly tipping actually is e.g. leaving items outside charity shops or recycling banks, near litter bins, left out for the scrap man etc.
- 40% of online respondents reported doing at least one of these with 31% saying they had carried out two or more acts of fly tipping.

How YOU can prevent fly tipping

We ALL have a legal obligation, or DUTY OF CARE, to ensure our household or business waste is disposed of correctly. The best way to stop organised fly tipping is to make sure that only authorised waste carriers take your waste away.

YOU could face prosecution and an **UNLIMITED FINE** if your waste ends up fly tipped by someone else. Remember, if it's YOUR waste, it's YOUR responsibility!

Avoid a fine. Put items in a bin, not by the side, don't leave items out for the 'scrap man', and always follow the S.C.R.A.P. code if you are having household waste removed.

Let's S.C.R.A.P. Fly Tipping

- SUSPECT**
All waste carriers, do not let them take your waste until they have proven themselves to be legitimate. A professional waste carrier should happily answer reasonable questions.
- CHECK**
their waste carrier's registration details, then verify them by searching the Environment Agency website (link below) or by calling 03708 506 506. Note down the registration number of the vehicle used to take your waste away.
- REFUSE**
unsolicited offers to have any rubbish taken away. If you do not trust that someone who you have spoken to will be disposing of waste legally, report their vehicle registration and name to the Environment Agency.
- ASK**
what will happen to your rubbish and seek evidence that it is going to be disposed of appropriately.
- PAPERWORK**
should be obtained. Make sure you get a proper invoice, waste transfer note or a receipt for your waste removal. This should give a description of the waste and provide the waste carrier's contact details.

How YOU can find LEGAL waste carriers:

Always carry out your own research and choose those services you wish to use. You can find licensed waste carriers in your neighbourhood by calling the Environment Agency on 03708 506 506, or visiting environment.data.gov.uk/public-register/view/search-waste-carriers-breakdown

What else can YOU do with YOUR waste?

-  Use your kerbside waste and recycling collection. Visit your council's website to confirm which items can be collected along with other service information.
-  Use your Neighbourhood Recycling Bank or Household Waste Recycling Centre (HWRC). Find out more information about where you can recycle certain items, the location and opening hours of your nearest HWRC, use permit applications and check in advance for queues using a live web-cam feed.
- wasteaware.org.uk
-  Use your council's bulky waste collection service. All councils in Hertfordshire offer a service to collect bulky items directly from your house – refer to your council's website or contact them for more details.
-  Sell or donate your unwanted items. You can sell or give away items online using websites such as eBay, Gumtree, Freecycle or social media community groups. Only donate items to charity shops during their opening hours.

FLY TIPPING IS THE ILLEGAL DUMPING OF ITEMS



AROUND TWO-THIRDS of household waste is dumped illegally.



If bins or banks are full, or the shop or centre is closed, take YOUR items away with you – DO NOT leave them behind, or YOU could receive a Fixed Penalty Notice up to £400 or face an UNLIMITED FINE.

Why fly tipping is rubbish

-  It is dangerous to people, animals and the environment.
-  It pollutes our gardens and devalues the local area.
-  It harms the environment and costs local authorities thousands to clear.
-  It is a waste of money to tip more.
-  It is the other antisocial behaviour such as graffiti and vandalism.
-  It is expensive for council taxpayers, local councils and landowners.

Over £820,000 of council tax payers' money is spent clearing fly tips on public land in Hertfordshire each year - nearly £50 million in England as a whole*. The enforcement costs are an additional £315,000 each year too*. Fly tipping is punishable by an UNLIMITED FINE or IMPRISONMENT.

Is YOUR business disposing of its waste correctly?

EVERY business that produces waste in the UK has a legal 'DUTY OF CARE' to manage it properly from the moment it is produced until it is either recycled or disposed of.

OVER 90% of UK businesses are not complying with the law and 90% of these are small companies with fewer than 50 employees. It is YOUR legal responsibility to always use a registered waste carrier, and/or register to transport YOUR own waste. The correct paperwork must be kept for at least two years.

A lack of understanding will not stop YOU receiving an UNLIMITED FINE in court. These websites will help your business comply with the law and YOUR Duty of Care:

How YOU can report fly tipping

Fly tipping is an illegal activity. If you see it in action, call the Police on 101 and report it as a crime in progress. ALL fly tipping should be reported online to your local council, regardless of whether you saw it in progress or have just discovered it.

Record as many details as possible:

 vehicle's registration number and details	 description of the people involved	 the direction they were travelling	 the exact location
 the date and time that you discovered the rubbish	 details of the items dumped	 photos of the waste and of the fly tipper if possible

How YOU can prevent fly tipping

We All have a legal obligation to ensure our household or business waste is disposed of correctly. The best way to ensure fly tipping is to make sure that only authorised waste carriers take your waste away.

Let's **S.C.R.A.P.** Fly Tipping

SPECT - Waste carriers, do not let them take your waste until they have proved themselves to be legitimate. A professional waste carrier should happily answer reasonable questions.

RISK - Check waste carrier's registration details, then verify them by searching the Environment Agency website (EIS Service) or by calling 0300 800 800. Note down the registration number of the vehicle used to take your waste away.

ROUSE - Unauthorised offers to have any rubbish taken away if you do not have that someone who you have spoken to will be disposing of waste legally, report their vehicle registration and name to the Environment Agency.

RISK - It will happen to your rubbish and well realise that it is going to be disposed of completely.

RESPONSIBLE - Waste carriers should be provided. Make sure you get a proper receipt, waste transfer note or a receipt for your waste removal. This should give a description of the waste and provide the waste carrier's contact details.

How YOU can find LEGAL waste carriers:

Always carry out your own research and choose where services are most likely to be found. You can find licensed waste carriers by using the following information:

- Waste carriers' registration number and name
- Description of the service provided
- The location they serve
- The exact location
- The date and time that your rubbish is collected
- Details of the name of the carrier
- Photos of the waste and of the carrier's vehicle

Why fly tipping is rubbish

- It is dangerous to people, animals and the environment.
- It is likely to spoil our homes and damage the local area.
- It harms the countryside and costs farmers the rewards to clean.
- It encourages others to dump waste.
- It attracts other animals/birds/wildlife and graffiti and vandalism.
- It is essential for council to ensure on-going local cleanliness and tidiness.

Fly tipping is punishable by an **UNLIMITED FINE** or **IMPRISONMENT**.

Is YOUR business disposing of its waste correctly?

EVERY business that produces waste in the UK has a legal 'DUTY OF CARE' to manage it properly from the moment it is produced until it is either recycled or disposed of.

Over 80% of UK businesses are not complying with the law and 70% of those are not complying with their own DUTY OF CARE.

It is YOUR legal responsibility to always use a registered waste carrier, and/or register to transport YOUR own waste. The current government waste tax is set for at least two years.

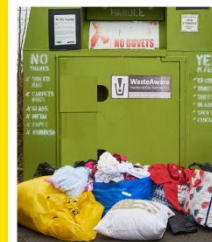

Crushing film warns would-be fly tippers

A FILM showing a fly-tipping van being destroyed highlights the dip in reports of fly-tipping.

The Fly-Tipping Group is made up of the commissioner's office, Hertfordshire Constabulary, the National Farmers' Union and the Environment Agency and is part of the wider Hertfordshire Waste Partnership.

A film made by the group shows a van that was used for fly-tipping being crushed, as viewers are reminded that they could face this, a £50,000 fine and a stretch in prison if caught dumping rubbish.

Police and Crime Commissioner David Lloyd said: "The message is that if you think you can make a business out of fly tipping in Hertfordshire you need to think again.

"Fines have not always proved a sufficient deterrent in the past but destroying these vehicles makes sure they won't be used for fly tipping again.

"It's important that residents and businesses carry out the

necessary checks to ensure that any waste collection contractors they engage are properly licensed so they don't end up in court being prosecuted for fly tipping."

There has been a 35 per cent reduction in reports of fly-tipping in Hertfordshire, according to figures from the county's Police and Crime Commissioner David Lloyd.

In 2016 the commissioner set up a £400,000 fund to support partnership schemes to combat the issue, and more than £30,000 of the fund so far has been spent to prevent fly-tipping by installing cameras in fly-tipping hot spots.

The responsibility to tackle rubbish dumping is primarily down to local authorities such as councils, but this multi-authority

organisation the Fly-Tipping Group has been cracking down on rubbish dumping.

Armed police are on camera

ARMED police officers in Hertfordshire will now be equipped with body worn video cameras in a bid to help bring "quicker" justice to victims.

The cameras were rolled out to all officers within the tri-force armed policing unit across Hertfordshire, Bedfordshire and Cambridgeshire on Monday.

The cameras are already used by response officers and the force says they have led to quicker justice for victims as well as providing reassurance for both the public and officers.

Chief inspector Julia Hands from the unit said: "Our firearms officers welcome the introduction of the body worn video cameras and we hope that they will also be welcomed by the public.

"The cameras allow for an accurate account to be recorded from the scene of an incident, which is particularly key in the highly pressured incidents that our firearms officers have to attend, when split second decisions need to be made.

"We believe that the cameras will increase our transparency and this in turn will help to improve the public's confidence and trust in our firearms officers who work incredibly hard in the face of serious threats to protect the public and fight crime."

Waltham Cross fly-tipper jailed for dumping waste across Herts

A serial fly-tipper from Waltham Cross has been jailed after dumping waste across Hertfordshire. Grant Gilham, of Brynstone Road, admitted five counts of fly-tipping household waste and was sentenced to 10 months in prison at Cambridge Crown Court on Thursday, September 28.

The case was originally brought before Stevenage Magistrates' Court by North Hertfordshire District Council (NHDC) who also acted on behalf of Stevenage Borough Council and East Herts Council on Friday 17 March.

However Gilham, who was formerly from Stevenage, pleaded not guilty, meaning the matter was sent to the Cambridge Crown Court for trial.
